Originally named "Lincoln Beach" it was renamed in 1925 to avoid confusion with the "new" park to the south.

James D. Lowman born in Maryland 1856, came to Seattle in 1877 as a teacher, changed to Wharf master of Yesler Wharf, bought into a book store + after two years owned it and joined with a printer to form Lowman-Hanford Co. stationers + printing. In 1886 appointed trustee of Yesler properties, turned the loss of the "Great fire" into profitable downtown development, organized coal, wood + sawmill businesses, Union Trunk (James St. cable car) line, platted Town of Yesler, held interests in Denny Hotel, Steam Heat + Power Co., Guarantee Loan + Trust Co., Wash. Nat'l Bank, Seattle Theatre; built Lowman Bldg. + consolidated city's street car lines. Was a Park Commissioner 1895-98. Active in Seattle Athletic + Golf Clubs.
